+ Pray for those in Authority +

This month, we Americans will experience a change in government. Some are happy with the change, while others think our country is heading in the wrong direction. Regardless of our feelings regarding our leaders, we are commanded to pray for them. Paul, writing to Timothy "urges" that "requests, prayers, intercessions and thanksgiving be made for everyone — for kings and all those in authority (1 Timothy 2; 1-2). While it is Paul who writes the words, we know that it is God Who gave the message. In other words, this command comes from Almighty God Himself! And why? We are given several reasons:

- "that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness" (1 Timothy 2:2)
- because "there is no authority except that which God has established. The authorities that exist have been established by God" (Romans 13:1).
- because "they keep watch over [us] as men who must give an account" (Hebrews 13: 17a)
- so that their work will be a joy, not a burden, for that would be of no advantage to [us]" (Hebrews 13: 17b).

At the same time, as stewards of the Gospel and as those who put God's Law above manmade law, "We cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:20). Therefore, it is our Christian duty and responsibility to be involved in our government, first and foremost through prayer for our leaders as well as for our fellow citizens, through speaking the truth in love relating to decisions and policies put forward and/or enacted, and then through informed voting as we educate ourselves on the issues confronting our great nation.

Certainly, we give thanks to God our Father Who has given us this great land where we enjoy many privileges, greatest among them, the right to assemble for worship, to pray unhindered, and to speak the message of salvation to all who will listen.

Steward Builders

A newsletter to help you grow as a steward.

The purpose of this newsletter is to share God's Word so that our members will better understand who we are to be and what we are to do in the light of the Scriptures. It is our hope that this monthly publication will help you grow in your relationship with the Lord and as a Christian steward.



A New Start

The soloist began to sing a special song during the worship service. It was awful! She had somehow started on the wrong note, terribly out of tune with the accompanist. She abruptly stopped and announced she needed a new start. She then began anew with a beautiful addition to the morning worship. Had she tried to limp through the first try, people would have remembered the off-key solo. Instead, by her second start, the congregation was assisted in their worship of the Lord.

That is the way it is with our lives, too. Our first start in life, our birth, is awful because of sin. We are born with a sin condition that makes it impossible for us to please God no matter how hard we try. We are captive to disobedience of God and His Law, to "doing it our way" and the passions of sin. But unlike the soloist we cannot even recognize we are out of tune with God.

Then it is God Who comes to us by His Word to show us our sin. It is He Who offers us grace and forgiveness through faith in Jesus Christ. It is He Who by His Holy

Spirit gives us that new start through Baptism. Through Baptism, we are united to Christ. Because Christ died for our sins, we are baptized into the death of sin with Him, that we may be raised to new life with Him.

Now our lives can be pleasing to God, like the soloist's second start. Not because of our work, but because of the power of God's gracious gift to us, Holy Baptism.

Stewardship

In the words of Rev. Waldo Werning: "Christian stewardship does not consist in raising money only, but in raising the people along with their money." The Apostle Paul put it this way: "I seek not what is yours, but you" (2 Corinthians 12:14). He was seeking much more than just a financial response. Stewardship should be seen as a whole-life response to God's grace, mercy, and love.



Paul did not hesitate to gather money in the church, but his emphasis was on motive, and his suggested method grew out of the motive. He showed that giving is a proposition of "hearts for God" rather than "purses for the church," of opening the heart through the Word rather than pulling at the billfold through emotional pleas. The heart of stewardship is the offering of the whole person.

Expressing Your Love


The three words "I love you" are powerful. Love is expressed not only in words but also in action. In fact, it has been said, "Talk is cheap." To tell someone that you love him is good to do, but love expressed by what we do and how we act is even better! As God's people, we convey love through our giving and serving.

In God's Word, He tells us how much He loves each of us and then proves it by giving His Son to die for us. "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). Jesus gave His life for us, and He keeps on giving. We respond to His love for us through our giving. When we give faithfully of our time, talents, and treasures, we show our love for Jesus.

God takes love seriously. He loves us, and He expects us to love one another. Jesus said, "...love one another: just as I have

loved you, you also are to love one another" (John 13:34). We love others by serving them. Serving communicates love. "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45).

The love that Jesus places in our hearts can be our fuel to make a difference not only in our lives, but in the lives of those around us. It is important to express our love as we thank God for His abundant grace, mercy, and blessing, but our words must be supported through the greater expression of our love as seen through our giving and serving, as God gives us grace to do.

A theme the Apostle Paul returns to often throughout his letters in the New Testament is that of putting off the Old Adam and putting on the New Self. Get rid of those things that are a hindrance to your life in Christ. "Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth. And be thankful" (Colossians 3:2, 15). Focusing on temporal problems, we tend to get bogged down. Setting our minds on things above, however, we cannot but be thankful for all God is and all He has done and continues to do for us in Christ.
